Hannah is also pursuing a journalism minor, currently taking the Advanced News Writing and Reporting class, and has published about a dozen stories for the Chronicle. Journalism, especially local journalism, has long been a means not only of keeping members of the community informed about what's going on around them, but also a way of creating and sustaining a sense of community before social media, obituaries and wedding and birth announcements in the local newspaper kept us connected to our neighbors and the major events of their lives.

The sports section helped us follow the struggles and successes of our high school teams.

And the front page took us into the workings of our local governments and the events and trends that affected our daily lives.

A strong argument has been made that local journalism is even more important in the social media age to build community cohesion in a time of increasing polarization and to provide verifiable information through responsible reporting.

But the benefits of journalism don't extend only to the audience. Journalists themselves build highly sought transferable skills in the reporting and writing processes.

So student journalism, the kind Shawnee State students practice at our news site, the Chronicle,

is a great way for young people to gain communication, critical thinking, and problem solving skills that they can apply in virtually any career they choose to pursue.

As the faculty advisor for the Chronicle, I get to work with great students from a range of majors every semester as they build those skills.

Hannah Kline is one of our current Chronicle staff writers, and she's had about a dozen stories published during her time in our two news writing classes here at SSU.

Hannah, do you mind telling us a little bit about yourself? Maybe your major, your hometown, and anything else you'd like to

Share. Sure I am a History major and I am minoring in both Journalism and British Literature.

I am from Lucasville technically, but it's pretty much Minford.

I'm also from Minford, so that's a nice coincidence. So, Hannah, can you tell us a little bit about what motivated you to pursue the Journalism minor here at Shawnee State?

Whenever I first came to Shawnee, I didn't know what I wanted to do. And I was in the General Ed program for my first two years and I

was advised to think about what I really wanted to do and what I enjoyed. And I realized I started taking a lot of history classes and I realized that history was what I was passionate about.

So, when I was talking about possible careers, I brought up librarian and my advisor said my advisor asked me what I thought about minors that would help with my career path that would fill it out a lot better. And she mentioned journalism.

And I said, hey, that sounds nice. And as I got to start writing in your class, I realized that journalism is pretty much what I do in my everyday life because I am so nitpicky about the questions I ask and I'm so

What kinds of challenges have you experienced in the reporting process for your stories?

I would say the major one would be having to get over my fear of

Whenever COVID hit, I isolated myself a lot and got really scared about just talking to people. So going out into the world again has been a great reward and challenge at the same time.

Yeah, I think that is definitely one of the one of the skills that we build as journalists is just those social skills, the capacity to to get over our shyness and have conversations with people. So again, building those communication skills, those oral communication skills as well as written communication skills.

So I want to focus on one particular story that you wrote actually last semester in the initial news writing class.

And that story really focused on faculty and student perspectives on the use of generative AI platforms like ChatGPT. How did you come up with the the idea for for that particular story?

ChatGPT. I was thinking about planning my stories ahead of time about what I wanted to research and be able to publish.

I thought, well, what's a great way to brainstorm things? And ChatGPT came to mind. So, I put in ChatGPT, "What are some good story ideas?" And the very first one that popped up was a story on AI. And I'm like, you know what, AI? You're right. A story on AI would be great.

And the reporting process for that story was pretty interesting for you. So, in addition to actually interviewing faculty and students about their opinions about the use of generative AI like ChatGPT, you actually put together a survey and distributed a survey to get a broader sense of people's opinions on Shawnee State University's campus -

about the use of generative AI in academic contexts. Can we just kind of walk through the reporting process for that story? So, can we start by talking about how you developed that survey and how you distributed it, how you got it out to folks to get their responses?

Yeah. So one of my

major questions I wanted to ask so top question I had to ask was what class are you in? Because I felt that maybe that was going to be a big distribution about maybe the older, older students thought that you shouldn't use it because they maybe weren't as used to it as younger students.

And I found out that wasn't quite the case.

In fact, I found out that there was an equivalent of 13 freshmen and 13 seniors that all varied within their opinions about AI. When it came to distributing the survey, I relied mostly on the SSU app, but then I also happened to be with Chandler, who was another writer, and was a distributor of "Bear Buzz,"

which went out every Monday to students and staff.

So his link to my survey also helped with responses a lot. And that was my two main sources of income for my survey.

OK, so how did you identify the specific people that you wanted to interview and get a more indepth response from?

My last question on my survey was just asking if anybody wanted to be interviewed. I didn't really care if they had a negative or positive. The survey was anonymous unless you added your e-mail, so I wouldn't know who you are or what you answered unless your e-mail popped up at the bottom of the questionnaire.

And I ended up having nine responses, so I ended up having nine people that I interviewed that were just students cause I also went on to interview 2 professors as well.

OK. So then once you had all that information, you had the data from the survey you had the responses from the people that you interviewed. How did you then

organize all of that information together to create your final story?

I try my best to rely on the inverted pyramid where I put the major information at the top and some of like the smaller details that maybe if you weren't reading all the way to the bottom, it wouldn't really matter. But if you do read it, I hope you read to the end.

So, I started with how many participants I had and then I broke down into the different thoughts about what students had, and I tried to get a little bit of the positive, a little bit of negative and also what the professors thought majorly on their students usage of AI and their own opinions about it.

So what in addition to the AI story, I presume. It was one of my favorites, so I'm going to presume it was one of your favorites too. What other stories have been your favorite stories to work on?

But have you learned anything through reporting those stories that you wouldn't otherwise have known about? Some of these events or some of these historical

Sure. So as I said before, a lot of the information I got through Dr. Andrew

Feight. But then there was also certain spots around Portsmouth related to the Underground Railroad that seeing those places in person... on I have a story about the Underground Railroad and just the tour that Dr. Feight took some people through. And he will also be doing it on February 24th...

being able to actually look at those buildings and see where conductors would help runaway slaves, or "freedom seekers," as they are now known as.

It was really impactful to be able to see that and report on that and know that their stories are getting memorialized and known today, even though the historical record was severely lacking back in the day.

So kind of on the flip side, how much do you feel like being a History major kind of helped you in the research processes for these stories, especially the ones that had a connection to local history?

So, the Scioto Historical is a big website slash app that I relied on when researching a lot of this, so a lot of my pictures I would, with permission from Dr. Feight, use in my stories and be able to pull some information if I was looking for like a little bit more that

For my story, I would pull some bits from that and it's really reliable and based for Scioto County, so it was very important for me to be able to use that.

What specific skills or knowledge do you think you've gained from the news writing and reporting classes?

And being able to just get out there and do that has been nice, but also just learning a whole new writing style has been very interesting. I never thought twice about every single news source having AP style as what they write about. And now whenever I see it, I'm like ohh that that all that stuff does line up with every single other news source.

So how have you used some of those skills in other contexts? Or I know you're looking forward to potentially being a librarian. How do you imagine you might use some of the skills that you've built through your student journalism in your profession as a librarian?

So just to wrap up now, Hannah, can you tell me what kind of advice you might give to a student who might be debating whether or not to participate or to get involved with the Chronicle or with the student news organization in their in their own high school?

You will be able to be more confident and also just get your writing out there in the world, which is something I never even thought about even doing whenever I first came to Shawnee. And now I've got
